



Perinatal High-Risk Areas




What is an OB Navigator?

- Community-based healthcare provider, such as:
 - -Nurse Family Partnership (NFP)
 - -Community Health Worker (CHW)
 - -Paramedicine
 - -Healthy Families
- Paired with a high-risk OB patient who receives Medicaid
- Visits patients in home and provides education and support and helps remove barriers that prevent them from engaging in obstetrical and then pediatric care for their newborn in the first year of life.
- Assigned based on level of risk assessment and planned birthing hospital

OB Navigator Goals

- To identify high-risk Medicaid OB patients as early in pregnancy as possible
- Connect an OB Navigator to each patient to address issues that contribute to infant mortality, such as:
 - Lack of prenatal care in the first trimester
 - Medical problems: Smoking, substance use disorder, prior preterm birth, diabetes, high blood pressure, etc.
 - Social-economic factors, which are barriers to a woman seeking and following through with care
- Help deploy services in communities with limited access to care
 - Partner with counties offering OB services
 - Hire APRNs or RN midwives to give care in counties without OB services
 - OB navigation with rural health grant

Indiana SLRP Purpose


Increase the number of health professionals, especially those serving in mental health and addiction disciplines in Indiana's Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs)



Year 1 Region of Interest

 Captures the top 7 rural counties with opioid related deaths in Indiana

 7 counties in the area of interest are in the CDC's top 5% of vulnerable counties for opioid use



SLRP Counties of Focus

- Federally Qualified Health
- Rural Health Clinic
- Community Mental Health

Funding

- Indiana has total repayment pool of \$600,000 per year
- Pool allows for 30, \$20,000 awards each year for a two-year commitment at practice site.
- No awards made to date



Recruitment Results

- Outreached to areas with scores too low to qualify for the National Health Service Corps Loan Repayment Program—thus filling the gap
- Received 60 applications at last count
- 30 can receive funding this year
- 16 are from priority areas
- 19 are providing mental health services

Site Eligibility

Practice site types represented in 2019:

- Community Mental Health Centers
- Private Mental Health Centers
- Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs)
- Federally Qualified Look Alike FQHCs
- Rural Health Clinics
- Critical Access Hospitals
- Women's Health Clinic
- Correctional Facility



Site Scores

- Low HPSA scores prioritized
- Indiana SLRP HPSA Scores ranged from 3 − 19
- Scores of 18 or above will qualify for National Health Service Corps Loan Repayment



States are at the forefront of promoting innovative strategies to address health care workforce issues, health systems coordination, and access to care. Due to competing priorities, complex infrastructure, and geographic disparities, states are seeking innovative solutions to ensure they have an adequate health care workforce, coordination of service delivery across disciplines, data to inform policy, and technology to enhance reach and coordination of the workforce.

Purpose

The NGA Center for Best Practices is working in partnership with the National Conference of State Legislatures and National Academy for State Health Policy to plan a multi-state meeting with key state health policy leaders. The NGA Center invites states to nominate a team of individuals from across health-related executive branch agencies and key partner organizations to participate in the meeting, which will engage state leaders in dialogue about how to effectively build and maintain health care workforce capacity to ensure access to care for residents. The event will include a full day and a half of sessions with national and state experts who will share their innovative solutions to address complete health care evrice delivery capacity issues.
