Subject: PY18 WIOA Allocation Estimates

Date: April 6, 2018

The US Department of Labor (DOL) has provided ESTIMATES of PY18 WIOA Allocations to the states and territories. For planning purposes, we want to provide you information about projected allocations to our twelve regions, along with accompanying documentation. We expect actual numbers in mid to late April and, historically, these numbers do not deviate significantly from the initial estimates.

The DOL plans to allocate a total of \$2.908 billion for WIOA in PY18 (\$2.920 billion in PY17) to states and territories. Indiana's estimated allocation is \$39,976,273 (TEGL 13-17, Attachment A), a 10% decrease from PY17.

As you are aware, WIOA funding is based on state unemployment rates, using a set formula established by the DOL with Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) data (Exhibit B). This formula was established to assist states with larger numbers of out of work individuals. As Indiana's unemployment rate continues at record lows, the DOL formula dictates less reliance on WIOA funding.

Indiana will also receive reduced funding in other areas. Wagner Peyser funding is projected to decrease by 5% from the previous year. Unemployment Insurance (UI) funding is being reduced by 2%. Other reductions in the Labor Market Information (LMI) area are projected as well.

Although these reductions demonstrate Indiana's strong work environment (February unemployment rate of 3.2), the challenges for serving some of our hardest to reach populations still exist. Accordingly, the need to partner amongst and within the regions in progressive and creative ways is essential. Continuing to evolve the way we engage and connect people and employers within our changing workforce environment will allow us to move our total workforce system forward.

Our goal is to move as many people and employers to their "Next Level" by connecting them to jobs and training. Accordingly, we plan to assist you with transforming operations to meet these workforce challenges. I am traveling to each Region to better understand your situation to help determine, along with the Governor's Workforce Cabinet, how to best assist the evolution of our workforce system.

The amounts provided in this table can be used to get a general idea of the funding that could be available to each state if funding levels for these programs are exactly the same as announced at the beginning of PY 2017 (see TEGL 27-16). In this table, the total dollars estimated to be available for PY 2018 were distributed among states according to the updated data factors for PY 2018. A number of decisions that have yet to be made could impact the final amounts obligated to each state.

WIOA Title I Allocation Parameters

Allocating Title 1 WIOA Funding

• The Law

- WIOA sections 128 and 133 identify the factors to be used to determine the within-state allocation figures for the Adult, Youth, and Dislocated Worker programs. The within-state allocation figures are developed by applying the current Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) data (July 1 June 30 of the prior year for Youth and Adult; October 1 September 30 for DW):
 - The Adult and Youth allocations are based on the following three factors:
 - The relative number of unemployed individuals in areas of substantial unemployment in each local area compared to the total number of unemployed individuals in areas of substantial unemployment in all local areas (33.3%);
 - The relative excess number of unemployed individuals in each local area compared to the total excess number of unemployed individuals in all local areas (33.3%); and
 - The relative number of economically disadvantaged adults/youth in each local area, compared to the total number of disadvantaged adults/youth in all local areas (33.3%).
 - The Dislocated Worker allocations are based on the following six factors:
 - UI Data (30%);
 - UI Concentration Areas (30%);
 - Plant Closings (15%);
 - Declining Industries (10%);
 - Farmer Rancher Hardship data (2%); and
 - Long Termed Unemployed (13%).
- A 90 percent hold harmless provision is applied to regional allocation figures. The hold harmless provision in WIOA states that a local area shall not receive an allocation percentage for a fiscal year that is less than 90 percent of the average allocation percentage of the local area for the preceding 2 fiscal years. Eleven of twelve regions (all but region 1) benefitted from the hold harmless provision in the youth and adult category in PY18. Two of the regions (2 and 11) benefitted from the hold harmless provision in the dislocated worker category in PY18.

EXHIBIT B (cont'd)

State Reserve Funding from WIOA Title I fund allotment (WIOA Admin & Set-Aside)

- Sections 128 and 133 of WIOA allows the state to reserve 15 percent from the Title I fund allotment:
 - o 5% for administrative costs, and
 - o 10% for statewide activities (set-aside), made up of:
 - Certain delineated required statewide activities, and
 - Certain delineated discretionary statewide activities.

<u>NOTE:</u> According to sources at NASWA, all states reserve the maximum allowable amount but vary the ways in which they spend these dollars.

- Under WIOA, DWD has reserved 5% for administration annually.
- Under WIOA, the state has reserved between 5-10% for required and discretionary statewide activities. The majority of the funding has been spent to the benefit of the regions:
 - o Required activities such as ETPL, monitoring/oversight activities, and system evaluation.
 - O Costs covered by the state that could be passed on to the regions such as ICE and TABE assessments, ICC/GEO Case Mgmt System, Business Consultant Contracts, etc..
 - o Competitive grants directly to the WDBs for employer focused activities.

State Reserve Funding from WIOA Title I Dislocated Worker Funding (Rapid Response)

- WIOA allows a state to reserve up to 25% of dislocated worker funding for rapid response activities.
- Under WIOA, the state initially reserved 15% of the dislocated worker (DW) allotment in PY15 (versus the allowed 25%) but reduced that to 10% for PY16 and PY17. DWD is planning to reserve 10% for PY18:
 - o The DW reserve allows DWD to provide funding to WDBs when a rapid response (RR) event occurs
 - Out of the \$1.5 million of DW reserves for PY17, DWD has allocated \$712,930 (47%) of the reserve back to the regions for RR events thus far.
 - Of this money, the regions have spent \$130,386 as of 2/28/18.

The WDB regional allocations that follow utilize the allocation methodology as described in WIOA and outlined above.
